HUAYU ENRICHMENT SCHOLARSHIP EXPERIENCE SHARING

Study period: September - November 2024

Wachira K. General Administrative Officer Center for International Affairs Suranaree University of Technology The Huayu Enrichment Scholarship (HES), offered by Taiwan's Ministry of Education, is a fantastic opportunity for students to study Mandarin in Taiwan while immersing themselves in its vibrant culture.



HUAYU ENRICHMENT SCHOLARSHIP (HES)

The scholarship provides financial support of NT\$25,000 per month to cover tuition and living expenses. Recipients can choose a study duration of 3, 6, 9, or 12 months, depending on their preference and qualifications.

The application period runs from February 1 to March 31 annually, with eligibility requiring a minimum GPA of 3.0 for undergraduate/high school students and 3.2 for graduate students. Applicants must also meet language proficiency requirements, such as TOCFL A2 or TOEIC 550 for shorter programs and TOCFL B1 for longer ones.

Overall, the HES is an incredible program that combines language learning with cultural exploration.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION PROCESS

The process of applying for the HES scholarship requires dedication and planning. First, I followed the announcements regarding the scholarship and available language programs. Then, I prepared the necessary documents, including my transcripts and language proficiency scores. Choosing the right university was a critical step, and once I decided on National Sun Yat-sen University (NSYSU), I applied to both the university and the scholarship program.

After receiving my acceptance, I completed the visa application and health check process and prepared for my journey to Taiwan. I was awarded a three-month scholarship and attended the program from September to November 2024. Though the application process may seem complex, the reward of studying Mandarin in Taiwan made it worthwhile.

NSYSU CHINESE LANGUAGE CENTER

Upon arrival, I took a placement test to determine my Mandarin proficiency level. The Chinese language course at NSYSU was well-structured, offering four levels: beginner, elementary, intermediate, and advanced. Classes were kept small, with only 4–10 students per session, and were conducted three hours a day, creating an effective and interactive learning environment.

NSYSU also provided opportunities to participate in cultural activities, such as Chinese character workshops, water sports, and singing contests, which made the experience even more engaging and enriching.

DAILY LIFE IN KAOHSIUNG: TRANSPORTATIONS & ACCOMMODATION

I stayed off-campus in a convenient location near the MRT, surrounded by restaurants, markets, and shops. Taiwan's efficient transportation system, including high-speed trains, local train, MRT, buses, and YouBike rentals, made commuting easy and affordable.

I was also impressed by Taiwan's eco-conscious lifestyle, which includes strict recycling policies, designated garbage collection times, and public water refill stations.

EasyCard, also called Yoyo Card (Chinese: 悠遊卡), is Taiwan's most popular and common reloadable smartcard for both locals and travelers. This super handy card can be used to swipe onto public transportation and pay for other things in Taipei an across Taiwan.

it became possible to swipe the card for buses, ferries, YouBike, and even some taxis. It can also be used to pay for items at most convenience stores, as well as some department stores, supermarkets, parking lots, and tourist attractions.




Since my stay in Taiwan was only three months, finding suitable accommodation was quite challenging, especially since the university did not provide dormitories this year due to renovations. Most landlords preferred longer rental contracts of at least six months to a year, making it difficult to secure a short-term lease. As a result, I opted to rent through Airbnb, which offered move-in-ready rooms without the need to purchase essentials like pillows, blankets, or even a mattress something that some unfurnished rentals require tenants to provide themselves.

For those staying in Taiwan for more than six months, I recommend searching for accommodation on platforms like 591 Rental or other local housing websites, as they offer more affordable and long-term rental options.



Typhoon Preparation

1. Prepare Essential Supplies:

Prepare flashlights, batteries, and portable power banks in case of power outages or emergencies. Store an adequate water supply in case of power outages and water outages.

2. Three-Day Food Storage:

Choose the food that can be stored at room temperature, has portable packaging, and can be eaten without heating.

3. Close the doors and windows tightly:

Check whether the doors and windows are secure, close non-essential doors and windows, and add wooden boards if necessary.

4. Stay at home and pay attention to Typhoon Updates: Keep track of typhoon developments through TV or the internet for the latest weather updates.
